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<u>General</u>

The Four Kinds of Money for School:

1) Student Loans/Student Grants/Access Grants

Student loans usually have to be paid back after graduation and generally they have lower interest rates than banks. Grants come from the government and don't have to be paid back.

2) Funding

Can come from your band, the MMF, or other organizations.

3) Internal Awards

Come from your post-secondary school and are only available to students attending those institutions.

4) External Awards

Come from hundreds of external organizations such as: Xerox, Manitoba Hydro, TransCanada and many more.

There are Awards for Everybody!

Students who....

- have financial need
- are parenting
- have great marks
- are in trades
- are active in their community
- are Métis
- are in specific programs

Bursaries vs. Scholarships

- Bursaries are distributed based on financial need.
- Scholarships are based on GPA, community involvement and/or volunteering.
- However, both types of applications often ask similar questions.

Financial Aid, Funding, and Awards

Student Loans/Line of Credit

There are **two** types of student loans:

1) Bank Loans

(must be paid back regularly and have high interest rates)

2) Government (Canadian Student) Loans

Canadian Student Loans come from two places:

- Provincial Government (Manitoba Student Aid)
- Federal Government (National Student Loan Centre)

Alternatively, you can apply for a line of credit instead of a loan.

3) Bank Student Line of Credit

- These are similar to loans but the interest rates usually start lower than regular student loans. But, once you graduate and are no longer a student, the interest rate starts to go up aggressively.

*If you are not a resident of Manitoba, your province will provide you with your student loan.

*Government Student Loans have a low interest rate. You do not have to pay back your loan until you are done your studies, but you must prove every year that you are still a student with a form from Student Loans.

*Speak with a specialist at your bank to see if either a Student Loan or Line of Credit is better for you.

Funding

Funding is defined as receiving a living allowance, plus tuition and books from an organization such as EIA (Employment Income Assistance), First Nations Bands or the MMF and does not need to be paid back.

Student Grants

Grants are **FREE** money that student loans offer you. When you apply for a student loan, you automatically are considered for a variety of grants.

Some Grants Include:

- Prince of Wales/Princess Anne Bursary for Indigenous Students (PWPA)
- Female Doctoral Grant
- Low Income Students Grant

- Middle Income Students Grant
- Students With Dependents Grant
- Students With Permanent Disabilities Grant
- Rural Students Grant
- Northern Students Grant
- ACCESS Grants

When you receive your student loan assessment, it will tell you how much of your loan is a **LOAN** (to be paid back) and how much is a **GRANT** (free).

3 Steps:

- 1) Apply for Student Loans
- 2) *Assessment:* You will get a notice of assessment in the mail telling you the amount of loans and grants you are eligible to receive.
- 3) *Accepting:* You can either accept the offer or you can deny. You also always have the opportunity to accept your grants before accepting loans.

ACCESS Grants

ACCESS grants are for students in ACCESS programs. These programs are designed to support student success by offering an array of services.

There are many ACCESS Programs including:

- ACCESS Southern Nursing (RRC)
- ACCESS Engineering (UM)
- ACCESS Business Administration Integrated (RRC)
- ACCESS Nursing (UM)

Speak with your academic advisor to find out if there is an ACCESS program available for you.

If you are accepted into one of these or other ACCESS programs, you will be eligible for top-up grants on your student loan.

Types of Awards:

Scholarships

• Awarded to students based on a certain criteria (academic merit, certain programs, etc.)

<u>Bursaries</u>

• Awarded to students based on their financial need

Fellowships

• Awarded to students based on certain criteria typically for more advanced studies like Masters or Doctorates

<u>Awards</u>

• Awarded to students based on certain criteria typically not academic based

Internal Awards

There are a few types of awards you may be eligible for at different points in time during your education with your post-secondary institution. Internal awards are only available for students attending the school in which they are offered. Check your school's website and/or your Indigenous Student Centre for assistance.

Entrance Awards

For students who are entering their first year of university directly from high school

Grad Awards

For students who are in graduate studies

Awards for Continuing Students

For students who are continuing their education in subsequent years

Applications

Filling out your application

When beginning the application process, READ EVERYTHING on the application.

Ensure all boxes are filled out accurately and completely.

Review the sample application in order to familiarize yourself with the form on page 12.

Every application has many pieces of required information, some include:

- Essay
- Letters of Reference
- Budget

The Essay should have the information that the selection committee needs to know about in order to make an informed decision. Essays are a crucial aspect of many of the scholarship applications. Look in the application; does it say what they want to know about? Maybe they want to hear about your struggles, maybe they would like to hear about your plans for the future, or how you impact your community. Find out what it is they want to know and tell them!

Essay Guidelines:

- Answer exactly what they ask, at the length they ask.
- Show what you need, but also how you give (i.e., to the community).
- Talk about your challenges, and how you deal with them.
- Have one general essay on hand that you can use and tailor for all of your award applications.
- Use a page number and a header & footer on each page.
- Be sure to indicate your financial need in some way or another if it is for a bursary (as financial need is often a significant factor in the selection process of a bursary recipient).
- Double, triple, and quadruple check your spelling and grammar!
- Please review the essay samples that are provided.

If you need help identifying your impact on your community (because you all do, you just have to recognize what it is you do), if you need help formatting your essay or even just someone to proof read it, then this document can help you out!

The budget should also reflect what they ask for. Some applications want general ideas of your expenses and income, while others want very detailed information. See pages 19-22 for a sample budget form.

Letters of References can also be a possible requirement. Read the application to see what kind of references they want. Do they want a community reference, a personal reference, an academic or a work reference? When you ask others to write you a letter of reference, be sure to give them time! Tell them which scholarship it is and give them the details about what the selection committee wants to know about. Afterwards, ask the person who gave you the letter of reference if you can use the letter many times or just the once.

Format your application! The nicer it looks on paper, the more your application will stick in the minds of the committee/jury members. Here are some really simple tips:

- Put a header and footer on every page. The header should have all your contact information.
- The footer should have the name of the application, the year and the particular part that it is.
- Make a cover page. The cover page should have the same header and footer, but it will also have a detailed list of all the items contained in the package.

Ensure your applications are sent to your school's award office and/or directly to the scholarship/bursary donor.

Questions & Answers

Why do you need letters of reference?

Organizations giving out scholarships have no idea who you are. They don't know what the community thinks of you and what you are capable of.

Who do you ask for a reference letter?

There are many people you can ask: teachers, professors, friends, coaches, managers, supervisors, co-workers... choose people who know you and will advocate for you.

What do they want to know in a reference letter?

- How your reference knows you
- How long your reference has known you
- Your potential for success
- Your athletic awards
- Your academic accomplishments, grades
- Your integrity as a person
- Connection to the community

How do you ask for a reference letter?

Don't be shy! People want to help by writing you a reference letter. Write a letter indicating the scholarships you are applying for. Send letters to all of the people you think would be a great reference. Provide information on the scholarship you are applying for (like a link or a brochure). Ask if you can use the letter more than once. And remember, always send a thank you to your reference!

If you want to use the reference letter for more scholarships/awards, ask your reference not to mention the award name they are referring you to

What do you do with those letters of reference?

Keep a copy for yourself. Make it a part of your portfolio. If you have permission, use the same letter for multiple applications. Read the letters to get a good idea of how others perceive your skills.

Important!

Read the application and make sure you send in the types of references they want. Keep your reference updated. People love hearing that they did something to help you succeed!

Sample of LRI Bursary Application

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Example Essay 1-Continuing student

name program year of study school My name is Sally Michif and ham a 2nd year student at the University of Manitoba. I am working on an Arts degree in English. I hope to work in the book publishing field one day, perhaps even publishing my own fiction.

I am applying for the Foundation for the Advancement of Indigenous Youth award because I believe that I am a good example of how Indigenous youth are excelling today.

As I grew up there was a lot of pressure on me to pursue medicine. I was academically gifted but I did not enjoy school and I did not want to be pushed into that field. I rebelled in high school and did so poorly that I ended up dropping out in grade 10. — how you dealt with challenges

After I dropped out of school, I did not do very much with myself. I eventually began to hang out at the community centre in my neighborhood. I was there so often that the staff people began to ask me to help set up for events, clean up after closing and other small jobs. Eventually they asked if I would like to help with some of the children's drop-in programs. By this time, I was actively participating in the youth drop-in programs and it seemed like a natural extension to do it for the younger children. My love of English came back to me and I began to look forward to the weekly homework club with the children.

After two years, I decided to go back to school. I returned to my high school and finished my grade 12. I did very well and with renewed confidence I applied myself to university, in Arts, not Sciences as my parents had hoped. I continued to do well in school however and my parents began to warm to my choice of programs.

Since enrolling at the University of Manitoba in 2009, I have thoroughly enjoyed my classes, but I have also found ways to be involved with the university campus while continuing to help with the homework club. I participate in the monthly potlucks at the student centre and I helped organize the Halloween party for the children.

This award will help me with the cost of school, which means I can use the money from my job to help pay for food. I am very thankful for the opportunity to be a part of the community centre and I am thankful for the opportunity to share my story with you.

- The degree of importance will vary between applications, but will always help.
- Besides helping you to win awards, it hugely benefits the organizations you are helping, offer you contacts in the community and job experience.
- It is important that we all find ways to help others in our lives; whether it is in large onetime events; small regular occasions or seasonal help.
- This improves our community and helps you support others as you hope to be supported in your applications for awards. There are a variety of ways and places you can help out. No one has to volunteer so much that it affects their school work, even three hours a week helps out.

The Budget

Every award donor, whether they are offering a scholarship or a bursary is going to want to know about your financial situation. In order for them to fairly assess each student's needs they require a thorough background of each applicant; a budget being one of those things.

However, a budget can be a long and tedious project to undertake, and can become cumbersome when you are repeating the same request application after application...

That's why it's a great idea to have everything figured out beforehand!

Prepare a 'master' budget that lists every possible financial criterion any award donor could ever want.

We have created a template for your use, along with some helpful hints and tips that will go a long way in making your budget all the better.

Hints and Tips

- **Be honest** with your income and expenses... the worst that can happen is you get turned down, the best that can happen is you get the award!
- Scholarship and bursary juries know that you get money from *somewhere,* and if you present a **zero budget**, they will not believe it
- It is ok to be reasonable with your **entertainment expenses**. Juries know that you buy McDonald's, take your kids to the cheap theatres, go to socials etc... think like a thrifty student-where would your entertainment come from? How would you pay for it?
- Most students don't spend \$200/month on clothes, but they might over the course of the year spend \$1200. Think of underwear, new winter boots, kids' clothes, socks... consider all those expenses over a year and then divide it into 12.
- Students who are funded still get scholarships and bursaries... so tell them about your **funding**.
- If you **share expenses** with a partner or roommate, decide on one consistent way of showing your expenses and income. If you share the rent costs, don't put that you pay it all... either say you pay half and this is what the full price is, or say that you pay all of it, but include all of the partner's/roommate's income as well.

- **Explain!** Explain why you have some expenses... explain why you need \$100/ month for this, that or the other thing. If you give an explanation, then the jury will understand your expenses.
- Use **N/A** when something is not applicable to you (i.e., parent's income or investment income) **and zero** (0) when it applies to you but you do not receive anything (i.e., internet because it is included in your phone bill)
- If you have a **line of credit or a credit card**, specify how much is already there for debt, how much is available to use, and how much your payments are.

Proof of Indigenous Ancestry

In order to apply and to be eligible for some awards you'll need to prove to the award jury that you actually are an Indigenous person.

Indigenous means Métis, First Nations and Inuit.

Unless an application specifically says "First Nations", "Cree", "Inuit", "Métis" etc. Indigenous usually means Métis, First Nations and Inuit.

Red River Métis

A Red River Métis student can prove their Métis ancestry by holding a Métis citizenship with the Manitoba Métis Federation.

Some external bursaries or awards may only require self-identification, but anything through Manitoba Métis Federation or Louis Riel Institute will require your MMF citizenship.

If you are not yet a citizen of the Manitoba Métis Federation and would like to get your citizenship card, get your genealogy done. You will need this for the application.

First Nations

If you are First Nations and have a membership card (treaty status or band), you can use that when applying for scholarships and bursaries. If a family member has a card you can use that and another piece of identification to prove your relationship to them. If you cannot show paper proof that you are First Nations, have a respected member from the First Nations community vouch for you. They should write and say they know that you are First Nations and explain why you do not have any proof of heritage.

Inuit

Inuit students also have the opportunity to have their post-secondary education funded. You will need to contact the region you live in. If you are from Nunavut, you may have to apply at an AAND office. Get in touch today!

*IMPORTANT NOTE: Always contact the organization asking for the proof of Indigenous ancestry. Always apply! The worst that can happen is you don't receive the scholarship, but the best that can happen is that you do!

The Manitoba Métis Federation

The Manitoba Métis Federation (MMF) has two academic funds available to help students in post-secondary education.

Metis Employment and Training Sponsorship/Funding

Through the Métis Employment and Training (MET) Department, the MMF can offer funding to students in programs of two years or less in high demand occupations or university students in their final year of a first degree. You will need to contact your regional office to discuss this option with a MET representative.

MMF Post-Secondary Education Support Program

Through MMF Provincial Education is the Post-Secondary Education Support Program (PSESP). This program is for Manitoba Red River Métis post-secondary students working towards obtaining a degree. Eligible programs include: undergraduate, masters, professional and doctoral degrees. Eligible full time or part time students will receive a maximum amount of \$5,000 in combination with the Louis Riel Bursary to use for education expenses. Be sure to apply for the Louis Riel Bursary prior to applying for the PSESP as this is an eligibility requirement. For additional eligibility requirements and details on the application process be sure to visit <u>www.mmfeducation.ca</u>.

Frequently Asked Questions

Below you will find a few frequently asked questions. Don't be afraid to ask more questions utilizing the contact information above if you are still uncertain.

Who is eligible for funding from the MMF?

For Métis Employment and Training sponsorship eligible students include selfdeclaring Métis or a registered Citizen of the MMF. For the PSESP the eligibility requirements indicate that you will need to be a registered Citizen of the MMF or are in the process of being registered.

What is considered in my application for funding with MET?

The program you are entering, the length of the program and whether it will lead to high demand employment are all considered in your application. Financial need and past education are also factors, among other items.

What if I already have a certificate, diploma or degree?

Funding through the Métis Employment and Training Department is not available to students who are currently employable, so students with prior credentials may not receive funding.

However, students enrolled in an eligible program and institution are encouraged to apply for the PSESP no matter the amount of previous post-secondary education experience or employability.

How much money will I receive from the MMF MET department?

It depends on a variety of factors, including: (but not limited to) how much you need, how much other students need and how much money is left in the budget.

Students awarded through the PSESP are eligible to receive a maximum amount of \$5000. Monies received from the Louis Riel Bursary will be included in this total.

How do I apply for funding?

Call an Education/Employment Counselor in your region and make an appointment.

Visit the website <u>www.mmfeducation.ca</u> to review the PSESP eligibility criteria and see if the program is right for you. If you have any questions feel free to reach out to the PSESP Coordinator at <u>psesp.info@mmf.mb.ca</u> for assistance.

Is there a deadline?

Deadlines for Metis Employment and Training sponsorship/funding vary in each region. It is generally a good idea to apply for funding 6 months before your program starts. University students need to contact their region in the January before their last year is going to start (i.e. apply in January 2022 if your last school year is 2022-2023).

The PSESP dates and deadlines are posted every new intake. Please refer to the website (<u>www.mmfeducation.ca</u>) to ensure you have the most up to date information. From this site, you are also able to view the dates and deadlines for the Louis Riel Bursary at the eligible institution.

The Louis Riel Bursary

A particular internal award available to students at Brandon University, St. Boniface University, University College of the North, Red River College Polytechnic, Assiniboine Community College, University of Manitoba, and University of Winnipeg is the Louis Riel Bursary. It is available every fall for students who are Red River Métis citizens. Applications are due December 15th, annually and are available at RRC.

The Red River Métis & Cantor's Family Award

The Red River Métis & Cantor's Family Award is available to Red River Métis students who are attending a post-secondary institution in Manitoba. The student must be enrolled in butcher/abattoir, culinary arts, or any agricultural programs which focus on the study of livestock and processes used for the purpose of feeding people or a related field in which you can express the connection to the butcher/abattoir field. Applications are due November 1.

Were you in a group home? A foster home? In foster care with a different family member? Did you have a social worker? Children and youth still under the guardianship of an agency are "in care". Once out of care, these youth are "alumni". There are a variety of scholarships specifically for youth in or from foster care.

Voices: Manitoba's Youth In Care Network is an organization for youth by youth in or from care. Voices administers 4 awards.

CFS Contact Information

You will need proof that you were in foster care. The letter will only need to say that you were, not why. If you know who your social worker or agency was, contact them. If not, contact the authority who provided your care.
